What a glorious Easter break we have had – full of sunshine and a chance to get out of doors. It's been great seeing people appreciate the simple things in life- as you come down on to the main playground the blossom tree has been spectacular and a welcome blast of colour. Like good learning, it restores the soul and makes the world look all good.

Summit Day Jubilee Garden Party

On 27th of May, the Friday before we break up for half term, we are having our usual Summit Day- but this time with a twist. Summit Day is the day closest to when Sir Ed and Tensing reached the summit of Everest-The news reached Britain of their achievement on the same day as the Queen's Coronation 2nd June 1953. To celebrate the Platinum Jubilee then, we

are going to try and have a **Buckingham Palace style Garden Party**. (Weather Permitting- but we think we can bring things inside if need be.)

In the afternoon we would like to invite you for a Cream Tea on the lawns between 1.30 to 3.00 pm. Entertainment will be provided with a few songs and possibly even a band (Y5's on their ukuleles!) The older children will have prepared their classrooms and be running some stalls within the classrooms and we also hope to be showing off their very best work that they have done this year. We will need your help however on the Scones front so the Great Hillary Bake Off is on for the lead up to the day. We can provide the jam, the cream and the tea or lemonade. But the scones would be an excellent cooking with the kids at home activity.

In the morning the children will do activities in their colour teams focussed on the Commonwealth. For lunch we are going to eat like Sir Edmund and the children will need to have Packed Lunches and appropriate clothing for the weather. Because, whatever the weather, we will be eating outside- even if it means soggy sandwiches in the rain. We have ordered a good dose of sunshine for the day, however. If you need the kitchens to provide a packed - lunch we will be sending a letter out two weeks before so as to order one.

As per every other Summit Day (when things were normal) children may go home when you are ready to leave, to kick off the Half Term Holiday if signed out with the class teacher. It'll be a day of bunting and buns and fun. So, make sure you can organise the time to come in and join in with us and all that is great about being at Sir Edmund Hillary Primary School and a member of the Commonwealth of Nations.

Stepping Down from Covid & Attendance

The guidance we are receiving is very much to be trying to normalise our lives and live alongside the virus. This means only staying off school if you are poorly – just like with any other cold. We are therefore no longer recording Covid absences separately- children are now just being marked down as absent through illness, rather than absent through illness with the virus.

We have contingency plans in place should we have an outbreak that is causing concern to the operation of the school which look largely like the changes to operations you have already experienced. After Easter we have almost seen a return to normal in our attendance- 96%. It had been as low as 92%

for many weeks in the Spring Term. Since September, however, the Government has maintained the legal requirement on parents to send their children to school (and therefore my requirement to enforce this). A child is considered a Persistent Absentee if their attendance falls below 90%. We always analyse the attendance of children below 95% to see if there is anything we need to do to prevent their attendance falling.

To this end we have lettered a considerable number of parents to let them know if their child's attendance is of concern. There is no blame if the cause of absence is genuine illness and largely the letters have been just information.

This is not the case if there are holidays or lateness involved- that is about adults organising and prioritising prompt attendance and very little to do with the child.

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Second Contacts

We have a good practice requirement to ensure that we are certain about the whereabouts of every child every day. This can take considerable time within the office when we have parents who have not told us if a child is going to be absent or how long for. We will ring through your contacts list until we have an answer as to the whereabouts of the child. We have also been known to make home visits. This has arisen through some extremely tragic stories nationally of children starving to death in houses where parents have had accidents. So please make sure your contacts list is up to date.

School Meals Cost

There is a rise in the price of a school dinner. A two course meal will cost $\pounds 2.40$ from this term onwards.

Holidays in Term Time

I have been surprised by the number of Term Time Leave of Absence forms we have given out over the last few days. Given that the children have missed so much school over the last few years the priority really should be on maintaining their presence in school and their learning. I know the holiday companies will be desperate for business and marketing like there's no tomorrow-but resist any further disruption to the children's education. The only reason why we authorise holidays in term time is if for instance you are in the Armed Forces and are dictated when you have your holiday. Also remember there are definite fines for holidays in holidays in September or during testing periods or if your child's attendance is already low through illness or other reasons.

Farewell, Miss Farish

Some of you will be aware that Miss Farish retired last term. The children won't have actually seen her since before Christmas as the toll of working full time was becoming too much. Shirley has been a really significant member of the team for nearly 20 years. As well as support for children in class, Shirley was instrumental in making our wildlife area what it is and become a significant part of our curriculum. She had a particular ambition for children with specific needs and therefore ran our award winning Boccia Team for many years in her own time. We wish her well in her next steps.

Phonic Progress

As you know, this was our major item of improvement from Ofsted and we have tackled it with our usual Hillary no- nonsense, get the job done attitude. Changing the way we were teaching Phonics has been a timely thing to do and as staff we are learning a lot in the process.

The children have instantly responded and are enthusiastically engaged in the new systems and especially with the confidence they find in tackling their new books.

We have joined something called the English Hub and this has released extra monies to us. With this we have been able to bring forward the buying of new stock so that some of the children are now able to have a real book rather than the books online, to reinforce their reading at home.

Assembly songs

These last few weeks in assembly we have been having some fun with some music. I taught the children to Dad Dance to Bob Marley's 'Could You Be Loved' and it was great when the children all knew the words to 'We are Family ,' by Sister Sledge. They are clearly getting a very good education at home!

We seem to be a great place for starting people off getting qualifications and moving on into full time posts. We often need Supply Dinner Staff as well so if you are interested in, or know of someone who may be, get in touch with Anna at the School Office.

iWatches

New technology seems to need us to generate new policies, so this is where we currently stand on this one. The school has always accepted watches as the exception to the 'no jewellery' policy. We need children to be able to tell the time (preferably analogue) and wearing a watch reinforces this.

Any device that connects to social media or has an e-messaging facility on it is not appropriate for general school wear. In this respect they are exactly the same as Mobile Phones, and school is just not the right place for these items.

Children's concentration needs to be available for the learning presented by their teachers and not on the virtual possibilities.

And a reminder on phones- Mobile phones are only allowed in school for children who have alternative home time arrangements. Parents must write a note to this end and they should be handed into the class teacher for safe-keeping.

Please **provide children with hats** as well as this is a key area of the body to protect. The children are rarely out for longer than 20 minutes, but we do want to encourage **good habits with respect to hats and sun cream.** Teachers generally do not apply sun cream to children so we encourage parents to apply sun cream before school. If there are further medical conditions that you feel we need to know about then do let us know- the safety of the children is of primary importance.
